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Due to preparation for and after-effects of Hurricane Michael early last month, we did not send out our October newsletter highlighting the activities at the Park in September. So we're catching up this month by including a September section as well as an October section.

<u>September</u>

If June, July and August were wet months (26.75 inches of rain), September was definitely a DRY month with only 0.75 inches of rain over 7 "rainy" days. The historical average rainfall for SIRP is 3.92 inches for September. The high temps ranged from 95.5F to 87F and the lows ranged from 74.5F to 67.6F, according to our UGA Weather Network weather station. This combination of hot and dry conditions made for favorable harvest conditions for peanuts and early cotton. Speaking of harvest, Dr. Vellidis' corn study had an average yield of 229 bu/ac (ranged from 276-199 bu/ac – all irrigated). It was managed for a 300 bu/ac yield goal. My corn study had an average yield of 176 bu/ac, including rain-fed plots (ranged from 227 to 114 bu/ac). It was managed for 225 bu/ac.

The SIRP staff stayed busy with a number of field activies. We sprayed and chemigated Dr. Kemerait's cotton fungicide study, applied fungicide on peanut studies for Drs. Harris, Porter and Vellidis, inverted then harvested first of 3 plantings of peanuts for Dr. Kemerait's grad student, Clarence Codod, and inverted peanuts for Dr. Porter. We had to do the usual servicing and tweaking/repairing of our peanut equipment ahead of inverting and harvesting. BJ continued irrigation in peanut and soybean studies.

As I noted last month, Stripling Park is being recognized by the Georgia Water Coalition in their 2018 Clean 13 Report. Back in September the GWC had an online/virtual press conference to release the names of the entities being recognized to the press community. It was an interesting event and I learned that the other recipients are a terrific, involved group. We are very pleased to be included.

The visitors to the Park represented quite a variety of guests. We enjoyed hosting the SW District 4-H Forestry Field Day and contest. Craven Hudson did a great job coordinating this event and it included 4-H'ers from three counties (Crisp, Decatur, and Randolph). It was impressive watching these students in action. We hosted two teachers and 35 middle school students from Lee County Middle School Ag/STEM program for a tour of irrigation practices and crop production. We hosted my colleague Dr. Brenda Ortiz from Auburn along with 3 of her students and Ashley Henderson of the Alabama Soil & Water Conservation Committee – for a crash course on ag irrigation and current technology. We also provided our conference room for regional Syngenta reps to host a customer lunch.

Our BIG event was the President's Farm Tour in late September. Dean Pardue, Commissioner Gary Black, and State Rep's. McCall and England accompanied UGA President Jere Morehead and Toby Carr, Assoc Vice President for Government Relations, for the President's annual tour of agriculture across the state. This year the tour included a brief 45 minute stop at the Park and I invited Drs. George Vellidis and Wes Porter along with extension agents Brian Hayes and Cale Cloud to join me in our presentations that afternoon.

With all of this month's visitors, including the ones mentioned above, the total number of visitors/guests reached 832 for the year.

<u>October</u>

Two words will define October 2018 – Hurricane Michael. All of us involved in Georgia agriculture will remember this past month for years to come. I'll have more on the hurricane later in the newsletter.

After a dry September, October brought a bit more rain to SIRP as we received 6.63 inches over 5 "rainy" days. Historically, the Park has received 2.23 inches of rain. Late in October we finally had a drop in temps with highs from 93.7F to 68.3F and lows ranging from 74F to 44.5F!

Before and after the storm, we were busy irrigating soybean plots, applying defoliants to cotton, harvesting cotton, pulling cotton stalks, fluffing inverted peanuts and then harvesting them, harvesting soybeans and mowing in between planted pine tree rows. We obviously spent quite a bit of time preparing for the hurricane and then assessing damage and cleaning up from the storm.

We hosted several visitors at the Park last month. Casey Cox with the Flint River Soil & Water Conservation District is producing a video to highlight ag water conservation in SW Georgia. She asked Dr. George Vellidis and myself to be on camera addressing various aspects of our work on ag irrigation efficiency and irrigation scheduling. The video crew was at SIRP for this session the day before the hurricane hit. Very interesting and professional video team.

We were pleased to host Lynn Torak, Jamie Painter and Brian Hughes from USGS South Atlantic Water Science Center along with their 4 visiting Brazilian water scientists from the Agência Nacional de Águas (ANA). We gave them an overview of SW Georgia irrigated agriculture as well as the water efficiency technologies and research going on at SIRP.

Richey Seaton (Ga Cotton Commission) brought 15 Congressional staffers (10 with GA congressman) to SIRP to learn about the research and extension projects related to ag water use effiency from Drs. George Vellidis and Wes Porter, Extension water agent Cale Cloud, Extension water educator Hunter Brannon, and myself. It was a great chance to reinforce the importance of federal funding opportunities to support our activities.

Finally, Stripling Park bids farewell to our long time Sr. Ag Specialist Ivey Griner as he retired from UGA on October 1st. Ivey joined the Park shortly after SIRP was created and had over 16 years with UGA/CAES. We appreciate his service to the Park over these many years.

We are pleased to announce that BJ Washington, previously SIRP's Ag Specialist, has been selected to become our next Sr. Ag Specialist. We are in the process of filling two open Ag Specialist positions now. One position is in the process of being filled, the other is still open. You can see the position announcement at:


Hurricane Michael

Hurricane Michael roared into SW Georgia during the afternoon of October 10th. Stripling Park experienced a max wind gust of 73.9 MPH according to our 'official' UGA weather station. We graphed data from our 'unofficial' Davis Instruments weather station (see below) and you can see that we experienced high winds for about 6 hours that day. Fortunately, due to the forward speed of the storm, we received only 4.16 inches of rain.

Damage to the Park was fairly moderate compared to so many others in SW Georgia. Our front sign was blown over. We had two coil up doors and one large pair of sliding doors blown out leading to some insulation damage. The corner of the roof of a shed over a drip irrigation manifold was peeled back. Several sprinklers and VRI valves were broken on one of our center pivots. Numerous pine trees snapped off and many of the old oak trees along our property line either blew over entirely or major limbs broke off. Much of the cotton plots were either completely or partially stripped of bolls with some plots so damaged that Dr. Snider didn't bother harvesting them. Drs. Vellidis and Kemerait plan to harvest their plots. Soybeans were blown around but not so damaged that we can't harvest and get good data.

Like so many of our neighbors, we lost power for a week. We spent several days assessing damage and cleaning up much of the debris. The university has brought in a construction contractor to begin repairs.


